Next, Janice Newsome, MD, confronts Jason Levy, MD; Michael Miller Jr, MD; and Alex Powell, MD, with a pregnant patient requiring uterine artery embolization. Kathleen Gibson, MD, takes on extreme venous insufficiency with Ellen D. Dillavou, MD; Raudel Garcia, MD; Antonios P. Gasparis, MD; and Raghu Kolluri, MD. Brooke Spencer, MD, presents a very challenging case of chronic DVT to Lawrence "Rusty" Hofmann, MD; Mark J. Garcia, MD; and Brent T. Steadman, MD.
