As an attending in the OR he would say, "The most important concept when operating is understanding the difference between a 2 and a 4. A '2' is when you do something *to* an eye; a '4' is when you do something *for* an eye."





This way you are always operating in the safest, most efficient manner. These words come to mind especially when I am in the OR performing complicated surgical cases.


